SOUTH WIRRAL IS 'GOING GOOGLE'



SOUTH WIRRAL HIGH SCHOOL IS JOINING 80 MILLION STUDENTS AND TEACHERS AROUND THE WORLD AND 'GOING GOOGLE'.

For the last 10 years students and staff at South Wirral have benefitted from the use of Moodle, our school Virtual Learning Environment. Moodle has been used by teachers effectively to set e-learning projects and provide a platform for revision for a number of years. Our use of technology to support learning has always been a strength.

Recently we have adopted a new IT strategy to better reflect the changes in technology. This aim of "Anytime, Anywhere, Any Device" further underpins our belief that learning isn't confined to the walls of a classroom. Over the last academic year students have trialled the use of new technologies including Google Classroom and the Google for Education platform of online tools. These new platforms allow greater use of technology across any web enabled device and doesn't require students to have access to specific software or device. The Google Platform is provided free of charge to schools across the world, with over 80 million

students and teachers taking advantage of these resources.

With this in mind and the confidence of knowing the Google platform meets the needs of students and staff we will be retiring our use of Moodle at the end of this academic year.

Students will now benefit from the continued use of Google Classroom for e-learning. Google Classroom provides a digital space for learning inside and outside of school. Students will benefit from automated reminders for deadlines via their school emails and a modern, easy to access method of home learning.

The adoption of Google Classroom as our e-learning platform also further compliments our Sixth Form offer, where sixth form students have access to 1:1 Chromebooks during their studies at our college. We feel this change in our e-learning tools will be greatly beneficial to our students and allows them 24/7 access to a suite of productivity tools and materials to help support learning.

front page will be posted onto our website (www.southwirral.wirral.sch.uk) news section and our social media accounts on Facebook and Twitter. As always our half termly digest newsletter will be available on all of these platforms and via EduLink One.



Today in LJM U we had a lot of fun. First, we had a lovely welcome by the staff and walked to the lecture theatre. There, the staff and students introduced themselves and talked to us about galaxies and space.

Next, we were put in 2 groups (Wilson & Stanley, Laird & Mayer) and each group was given a different activity. My group's first activity was about the university, we were all put into groups of 4/5 and had to draw the 'perfect student' - we had to use our imagination. My group drew a sportsman who was 19 years old and a footballer. Because the activity was a competition, we had to work as a team. My group won (winning some LJM U stress balls!) - and we packed away and moved onto the next activity.

The second activity was about space. In pairs, we got given sheets of paper with a code of different galaxies and it's name. This was very challenging, but we correctly identified lots of the galaxies.

Then we had lunch, getting to listen to music which was fun.

Our last activity was getting a chance to visit the houses of some of the students. We all walked into a comfy hall of residents where both groups explored the rooms. We thanked the staff for a great trip and headed back to the train station.

SOUTH WIRRAL HIGH SPACE WEEK 24-27 JUNE

SPACE WEEK

IN CONJUNCTION WITH HI-IMPACT CONSULTANCY, THE SCHOOL PROVIDED A WEEK OF EXCITING SPACE-THEMED ACTIVITIES CULMINATING IN THE LAUNCH OF A BALLOON - WITH PAYLOAD - INTO NEAR SPACE

MONDAY & TUESDAY

Students from South Wirral & local primaries took part in a carousel of activities provided by a combination of South Wirral and hi-impact staff including:

Prediction & Google Earth Simulation

Students used Google Earth and an online flight predictor to look at the implications of weather conditions and the choice of launch site on the flight path of the balloon.

They looked at the altitude of the launch site, possible height the balloon would burst at, its descent rate and how this, and the weather conditions, could affect the path of the balloon, its launch and eventual landing site.

They used this information from the predictor website to Google Earth and use it to visualise in 3d, the balloon flight. This was compared with the data we received from the GPS trackers on the actual flight as a 3d visualisation.

Mission Patch Activity

Students learnt what a mission patch is and how NASA teams design a patch for each mission. They then designed their own mission patch for the Balloon launch using 'pen' and paper.

One design from each class can be selected to go through to the 'finals' and a team of teachers then select the final patches which were laminated and taken to the launch to attach to the balloon

Sensing Space

The students were introduced to the Raspberry Pi which we used to record data from the space mission. They learned how to code the Sense Hat Pi to record temperature, humidity and air pressure with the Sense Hat emulator using the Python programming language.

Students used the emulator to test their code and ensure as they change the different variables such as temperature, process and humidity, as it is recorded by the Sense hat. Additionally, on the launch day, the sensor sent to space recorded altitude and record images from a Pi camera.

All the data will be recorded on the Pi, downloaded as a spreadsheet

Ping Pong Science

Students worked in groups to think of a simple experiment to send up to near space that can be contained in a ping pong ball. They had to decide what 'object' they can realistically send up by the launch day and say what they thought would happen to the object as it travels through a thinning atmosphere

Payload Design

Students were asked to think about the possible ways to return the equipment for earth to retrieve data and experiments. They designed a range of structures to ensure the payload will land safely, then designed a structure using everyday materials to safely return a simulated payload to the Earth.

Students also had the opportunity to hold a 40 minute Skype call with Dr Croft, Professor of Astrophysics UC Berkeley.

Dr Croft discussed the physics of launching and operating craft and robots in space and how the payload and balloon will behave as it rises into the atmosphere and into near space. Dr Croft has launched a number of successful balloon launches with students in the USA. He is involved with the Breakthrough Listen initiative, the world's largest SETI program based at the University. Students were invited to ask questions to Dr Croft in the Q and A session as well as respond to questions and ideas he posed through the session.

WEDNESDAY


Wednesday saw the 'tethered launch' of the balloon on the school field. Groups of students were able to experience the balloon close up and one of the hi-impact flight crews spoke about the inflection and flight of the balloon, making links to the work activities they have been involved with over the last few days.

Final predictions were made, with Ping Pong Science winners revealed and the plan for Thursday finalised.



On the final day, a small group of students travelled to Welshpool to launch the balloon and payload, with the remaining students staying back at 'Mission Control' to monitor the journey.


The launch was a huge success, with the balloon reaching a phenomenal height of 27,261 meters!

DROP EVERYTHING AND READ

LITERACY TRANSFORMATION AT SOUTH WIRRAL HIGH SCHOOL

LITERACY HAS ALWAYS BEEN AT THE HEART OF EVERYTHING WE DO AT SOUTH WIRRAL HIGH SCHOOL.


When we talk about literacy, what we are actually talking about is: reading, writing and oracy; skills we use in everything we do at school. Over the past few years we have gone through an exciting transformation as a school and literacy has patiently waited on the side-line for its turn; and what a transformation it has had!

In September when our students come back to school they will see the usual 'Staff Literacy Pledges', the literacy marking in books and displays of recommended reading that they are use to, however, there is more. KS3 have had a change to their morning routines, once a week they will have a Drop Everything and Read (DEAR) session during form time, 20 minutes to read what they wish. This may look different in different forms, some form

tutors and students may choose to have 20 minutes of quiet reading, others may opt for a whole form read; the important points to note are that EVERYONE will read, even the staff, also we will expect every Year 7 and Year 8 student to carry a book to read in their bags, at all times. The library is waiting for an influx of students in September.

Year 7 will have a added advantage, throughout the summer term staff have been selecting challenging reading material that links in with the Year 7 curriculum. Each subject was tasked with choosing just one example of the challenging texts students will read, to go into a Year 7 Challenging Text Anthology - it was nothing short of a herculean task to make these decisions, but it was done. Year 7 will be given this anthology to keep in their bags and if they choose to, they can use this as their DEAR book in the first term, getting a head start on the year ahead.

Mr Harrison our literacy coordinator has added a little something to the KS3/4 and 5 planners. We will have a 'root word' of the week, each week we will look at a word and understand the origins of that word and how it affects the spellings and meanings of the words connected to it; what students will do at some point in the week is write their own definition for that word as well as write that word in a sentence - building up their use of vocabulary. In a similar way there will also be a grammar/punctuation rule of the week too.



Mr Murray will be supporting the literacy team with lots of writing competitions and challenges throughout the year, he will be using entries and other pieces of excellent work to build his literacy newsletter which we will send out each term.

So.... we have reading (DEAR and the anthology) and writing (word and grammar/punctuation rule of

the week), what about oracy? Staff will have training through out the year on how to promote and build outstanding oracy opportunities in lesson, students will need to be prepared to talk more!

This is just the very beginning of an exciting year of literacy transformation at South Wirral High School.



ECO GARDEN UPDATE

WORK HAS CONTINUED THIS TERM ON THE DEVELOPMENT OF OUR ECO-GARDEN.

Earlier in the year, thanks to the support of our community, we were awarded a grant from Tesco Bags for Life scheme of £1,000. Staff have been busy converting an area of land into a safe eco-garden for students and staff to enjoy.

As part of the project, a number of local residents have donated soil, flagstones, plants and materials to build cold frames to help develop our garden. We are hoping to integrate the garden into our curriculum for students in photography, food

technology and science next year.

We are now approaching completion ready just in time for our summer school students to enjoy some outdoor projects next week. The garden is also going to be a source of food for our summer school providing potatoes, salad, beans, peas and radishes.

Next term the eco-garden will also be used as a site to bury a time capsule marking 50 years of education on this site. The time capsule will contain items selected by students to show what school is like in 2019.



FOOD TECHNOLOGY AND HEALTH AND SOCIAL NEWS

IT'S BEEN A BUSY HALF TERM FOR THE FOOD TECHNOLOGY AND HEALTH AND SOCIAL DEPARTMENT.

Our year 8 students spent a day at the Cheshire show in June. Although the heavy down pours of rain had made it very muddy under foot it didn't dampen the spirits of our students. During the day they saw many aspects of farming life from live stock best in show, to how our food gets from farm to plate.

Our Health and Social year 10 students hosted St Mary's Church CAMEO group. It was an afternoon full of entertainment. Our students served refreshments and chatted to the group about the history of Eastham and their memories of Plymyard Avenue and South Wirral High School or Eastham

Secondary School as some of us oldies will remember it as! We were then all entertained by our brilliant Addams Family cast which ended the afternoon off perfectly.

We also had our annual visit from the Chernobyl Children. A group of children from Belarus come to the Wirral every year and are hosted by a group of local families. Although the Chernobyl disaster happened in 1986 people that live there are still affected by the radiation in the area. The children stay for a month and and go on days out such as Blackpool and the Cheshire Ice Cream Farm. They also receive dental treatment and eye tests which they don't always get at home because alot of the children come from very poor backgrounds. The children visited us for a morning

and our Year 10 students were again excellent hosts. The children had a food technology lesson making delicious brownies and a PE lesson playing football and rounders with the year 10's and some of our year 7's. We finished the morning off by presenting them with some gift bags which the students had put together. We look forward to seeing the children again next year.

UNIFORM, APPEARANCE & EQUIPMENT

As families prepare for the new school year I would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone of our student dress code, appearance rules and required equipment.



UNIFORM

All students in Years 7 to 11 must wear:

- Black blazer with SWHS badge
- Long or short sleeve white shirt, must be tucked in and done up to the collar
- School tie with House colours – available from Student Services
- Black school trousers, black skirt or black pinafore dress.
- Skirts must be knee length
- Plain black belt with plain, non-branded buckle
- Plain black, grey or white socks or tights
- Polishable black school shoes; either flat or with a heel not exceeding 5cm
- Sports trainers may only be worn for PE lessons or for games activities at lunchtime only
- Other footwear, including walking boots and plimsolls, are not allowed to be worn.

APPEARANCE

- Jewellery should not be worn in school. An inexpensive watch and one small stud in each ear are acceptable
- Earrings, nose rings/studs, tongue studs, eye-brow studs or any visible body piercings are unacceptable
- Clear nail varnish only is acceptable
- False / acrylic / gel nails are not permitted
- No false eyelashes of any description are permitted
- Students in Years 7, 8 and 9 may not wear make-up. Make-up worn by students in Years 10 and 11 must be discreet and business like.

HAIRSTYLES

- Haircuts and styles must be smart and business like, and not covering the face or eyes
- Hair accessories should be in the school colours of black, red or white
- No shaving all or part of the head
- No lurid, unnatural or extreme colouring
- No tramlines

EQUIPMENT

The following items are essential and should be brought on a daily basis:

- School planner
- Pen, pencil, ruler and eraser
- Calculator
- A protractor, a pair of compasses
- A strong bag to carry homework, equipment and P.E. Kit.
